Tri Valley Health System awarded \$42,500 for stroke care

The American Heart Association awarded two \$42,500 grants to organizations with ideas to improve and advance care for rural stroke patients in Nebraska during its Nebraska Mission: Lifeline Stroke Advancing Stroke Care Summit on May 4. Tri Valley Health System was one of the recipients.

Tri Valley Health System recognizes that in the acute phase of caring for a stroke patient it can take hours to contact a neurologist. With use of grant funds, Tri Valley Health System will implement the Acute Neurology and Stroke program through a partnership with Bryan Telemedicine. The patients in southwest Nebraska and Northwest Kansas with potential neurological issues will benefit greatly from this program, as they will be able to get the care they need when they need it.

"Tri Valley Health System is so grateful for the grant funding from the ourselves in providing quality progressive care in both our rural community and the surrounding area. This will be a great benefit to stroke patients as it will allow a quicker diagnosis and recovery period," said Tri Valley Health System Chief Nursing Officer Clay Jor-



Helberg completes quality improvement residency



Tri Valley Health System Quality Director Barb Helberg recently completed the Nebraska Hospital Association's Quality Improvement Residency Program. The program is intended to serve as an introductory course for novice quality leaders. The objective of this program is to provide a collaborative learning environment focused on mentoring and networking for hospital quality personnel to develop empowered statewide leaders.

Project objectives for participants were to articulate the definition of quality and performance improvement and explain how quality fits into the bigger picture of rural hospitals, adapt learning on surveys and accreditation to prepare and lead through a successful regulatory inspection, articulate and complete mandatory external data reporting requirements, describe best practices related to determing and driving quality and performance improvement, recognize, analyze, abstract, and evaluate good health care data, list compare, and adapt patient safety tools, employ and exercise risk management techniques, select and employ patient and family engagement and emergency management tools and techniques, describe the role of quality and performance improvement specific to medical staff functions, distinguish and adapt quality infection prevention plans, and articulate population health promotion and continuum of care activities needed to adapt to the changing health care reimbursement structure.

Transitional care management started for medicare patients

Tri Valley Health System Rural Health Clinics have implemented a new service, Transitional Care Management (TCM). TCM addresses the safe transition of a Medicare patient, with moderate to high complexity medical problems, from the inpatient hospital setting of care to their home or other outpatient care environment.

TCM initiates when an inpatient is discharged from the hospital and then a 30-day managed care follows with a phone call from the Clinic Care Coordinator in the first few days after discharge. During the initial phone visit, the Coordinator assesses the patient's transition to home, ensuring that the patient is managing well. A clinic visit with the patient's primary care provider is scheduled 7 to 14 days after the hospital discharge which enables the patient's provider to further assess the patient and address any patient care needs during this transitional period. The primary goal of TCM is to manage our patients' care during this transition home, see their provider for a hospital follow-up appointment, and reduce the need for readmission to the hospital.

TCM is a collaborative and coordinated team approach involving the Rural Health Clinics, Hospital Nursing Services, Social Services, Health Information Management, and Patient Accounting departments. Our mission to improve the lives we touch by providing care of the highest quality throughout life's journey will guide our care teams during our patients' transition to home.

Medication safety initiative begins



Tri Valley Health System is starting a medication safety initiative to ensure patients are safely taking the correct prescribed and over the counter medications. Tri Valley Health System will be giving out medication bags at rural health clinic appointments and educating patients about bringing in all of their medications to their appointments.

Tri Valley Health System wants to ensure that we have a correct list of all the medications that you take, including the dosage and instructions for use and to help you understand why and how to take your medications. Prescription and over the counter medications are used frequently to treat thousands of unique health issues, but many times, patients are not openly communicating with their primary care provider about all the medications they are taking. Patients may assume that their primary care doctor is aware of medications prescribed by specialists or other providers, but that is not always the case. Therefore, it is vital that patients bring in their medication bottles or have a detailed, accurate list of all medications they are taking.

Your pharmacist is our medication ally. Your pharmacist can be a helpful resource for patients who have questions or concerns about medications they are prescribed or may be purchasing.

This initiative will help to ensure that you and your primary care provider have a good understanding and that your health needs are being addressed in the best possible way.

Tri Valley Health System helps train med students

Tri Valley Health System is committed to the learning environment, and to the development of future medical providers. In efforts to enhance our commitment to future providers, Tri Valley Health System has initiated a clinical affiliation with the University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC), Omaha, Nebraska. UNMC prepares future physicians to meet the health care needs of patients by providing a strong foundation in the basic, clinical and health-systems sciences as well as clinical rotations and training with faculty preceptors at affiliated health care organizations. Tri Valley Health System's family medicine physicians will preceptor and mentor medical students during various stages of their clinical training. UNMC's College of Medicine clinical rotations include six-week clerkships for the 3rd year medical students and clinical rotations for the 4th year medical students.



Nurses at Tri Valley Health System are being honored with the DAISY Award for Extraordinary Nurses ®. The award is part of the DAISY Foundation's mission to recognize the extraordinary, compassionate nursing care they provide patients and families every day.

Taylor Livingston, RN was honored with the DAISY award in May. Kinsley Pearson was the other nomineee for this year's Daisy Award.

Taylor's nomination letter said, "My mom had a stroke on 4/5/2022. And Taylor was one of the nurses helping my parents. It was a very traumatic experience obviously for my mom, but for my dad as well being the only person there for her at the time. We've known Taylor all our lives, and she is one of the nicest people in the world. She went out of her way to show my dad that she would help in any way possible and be there if needed. She is an amazing person, and an absolutely exceptional nurse. She helped so much in such a trying time. She deserves all the love and praise possible. Thank you so much Taylor, you have no idea just how grateful we are for you."

The DAISY Foundation is a not-for-profit organization, established in memory of J. Patrick Barnes, by members of his family. Patrick died at the age of 33 in late 1999 from complications of Idiopathic Thrombocytopenic Purpura (ITP), a little known but not uncommon auto-immune disease. (DAISY is an acronym for Diseases Attacking the Immune System.) The care Patrick and his family received from nurses while he was ill inspired this unique means of thanking nurses for making a profound difference in the lives of their patients and patient families.

Nurses may be nominated by patients, families, and colleagues. The award recipient is chosen by a committee at Tri Valley Health System. Awards are presented during Nurse's Week in May and are attended by the Honoree's colleagues, patients, and visitors. Each Honoree receives a certificate commending her or him as an "Extraordinary Nurse." The certificate reads: "In deep appreciation of all you do, who you are, and the incredibly meaningful difference you make in the lives of so many people." Honorees also receive a DAISY Award pin and a beautiful and meaningful sculpture called A Healer's Touch, hand-carved by artists of the Shona Tribe in Zimbabwe.





Tri Valley Health System recognizes grant funding as a crucial factor in the growth and success of our organization and the services that we are able to offer our patients. Grants are vital to continuing to provide progressive care along life's journey. Our grant writer has obtained a certificate in grant writing from GrantsMagic U. She utilizes Grant Station to search for grants in Nebraska and nationwide whose funding interests match our mission. These two factors allow her to write high quality, critical mission focused grant proposals.

Clinic Rooms Receive Equipment Upgrades and Portable Air Purifiers

The Arapahoe Medical Clinic, Cambridge Medical Clinic, and Indianola Medical Clinic will all be receiving new exam chairs and provider stools. Each clinic will also receive new 40 inch seat exam chairs to accomodate all patients needs. The new equipment will allow for best practices in infection control when cleaning, be

more comfortable for examinations,





and allow easier positioning of

patients. The new sleek, black upholstery will be a nice update to the exam rooms.

Each clinic room will also receive a portable Medical Grade Air Purification System. These machines eliminate allergens, pollen, dust, pet dander, mold

spores, bacteria, viruses and more. The air purifiers will allow for much faster turn around if a room is contaminated by airborne particles.

The grand total for this project closed in on nearly \$200,000.

Tri Valley Health System did not have to foot this bill thanks to a \$150,000 Centers

for Disease Control and Prevention Rural Health Disparities Grant and approximately \$50,000 in funding from Health Resources and Services Administration COVID-19 Testing and Mitigation for Rural Health Clinics Grant.

Tri Valley Health System to Implement New Stroke Program

When patients with acute neurology symptoms or stroke signs come to Tri Valley Health System (TVHS), they will soon have improved opportunities for treatment. TVHS will soon be utilizing the Bryan Telemedicine Acute Neurology and Stroke Program. TVHS was awarded \$42,500 by the American Heart Association, Mission: Lifeline Advancing Stroke Grant to cover some of the program build and continuation costs.

When a patient presents to TVHS with acute neurology symptoms or signs of a stroke, they will soon have access to board certified physicians qualified to make medical decisions related to stroke care. The patient will be able to receive consultation immediately via phone and within minutes on the new telemedicine carts. The telemedicine physician will assist the TVHS provider in providing patient oriented care that meets best practices and better meets the guidelines set forth by the American Heart Association for stroke care. These services are available 24 hours per day, 7 days per week, 365 days per year in both the Emergency Department and inpatient setting.

The TVHS nursing staff, physicians, and support staff have gone through extensive training on the new program. We are excited and proud to release this new program.

Hospital to Install Web-Controlled Global Plasma System

A new heating, ventilation, and air conditioning system, specifically the Global Plasma System with Digital Control Upgrades is to be installed in the hospital with a price tag of \$240,000. This will be paid in full by a combination of two grants:

\$100,000 from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Rural Health Disparities Grant and approximately \$140,000 in funding from the Health Resources and Services Administration COVID-19 Testing and Mitigation for Rural Health Clinics Grant. This new system improve air quality and reduces certain airborne viruses and bacteria. The digital controls will allow the Plant Operations team to more easily control isolated parts of the system.

Rural Health Clinics Distributing Free At Home COVID-19 Test Kits

Cambridge Memorial Hospital, dba Tri Valley Health System (TVHS) is providing free at home COVID-19 test kits to community members at their rural health clinics in Indianola, Cambridge, and Arapahoe. The test kits have been made available by the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) COVID-19 Testing Supply Program, a collaboration between HRSA and the Department of Health and Human Services that has directly supplied COVID-19 testing supplies to Medicare-certified Rural Health Clinics at no cost. The clinics have distributed hundreds of test kits thus far. Come get your free COVID-19 test kit today!


COMING SOON: New Quality Reporting Software

Tri Valley Health System has selected to utilize this year's Small Rural Hospital Improvement Program (SHIP) Grant in the amount of \$12,836 for a new quality reporting software. The SHIP grant is available for small rural hospitals accross the country annually and can be used for operational improvements including software and training. The Strategic Quality Support System (SQSS) will allow us to reduce the number of software systems necessary. This new system will house information for safety, quality improvement, and policies. Currently, these all have their own systems. SQSS will streamline quality and safety tracking.
